“STATE AID TO FAIRS”

The General Assembly of the State of Tennessee, realizing the importance of the educational value of fairs, increased interest in livestock, agriculture, Junior Agriculture and Livestock such as 4-H and FFA Clubs, resulting from competition at fairs, has annually appropriated a fund known as State Aid to Fairs. This fund is allotted and distributed by the State Department of Agriculture through the Commissioner of Agriculture and is State Aid to farmers, livestock breeders, etc. The Tennessee State Fair participates in this program and receives each year a proportion of this allotment. “For the purpose of encouraging fairs to excel in their usefulness of their respective areas, a Merit Award provision was also made in the appropriation. It is hoped that the Tennessee State Fair can have an exhibition sufficiently creditable to warrant its receiving one of the special Merit Awards in addition to its allotment of State Aid.”



TENNESSEE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

All Health Rules and Regulations will be enforced by the Tennessee State Fair

1. It is expected that all exhibitors will bring only healthy animals to fairs and exhibitions. All animals are subject to being inspected after arrival at the show facilities and any with clinical signs of contagious disease will be sent home immediately. Certificate(s) of Veterinary Inspection are to accompany the animal(s) to the respective shows.
 2. Health certificates issued in satisfaction of these Tennessee Fair Regulations shall be good for 90 days for Tennessee livestock only.
 3. Tennessee requires that all poultry assembled at shows or exhibitions be accompanied by evidence of a negative test for Pullorum-Typhoid with 90 days or originate directly from a flock which has been certified as Pullorum-Typhoid Clean under the Tennessee Poultry Improvement Plan. As per last year's testing guidelines, on-site testing of poultry is no longer allowed. As part of increased awareness and surveillance for Avian Influenza and other poultry diseases, all birds physical health appearance should be assessed at the time testing is conducted. Testing must be completed prior to commingling with birds of other ownership.
 4. Any "chick chain" birds that have been commingled with birds of unknown disease status must test negative for Pullorum-Typhoid prior to entry.
 5. Please note that exhibition requirements for out-of-state livestock are the same as regular import requirements.
 6. Requirements for the Junior Beef and Junior Sheep shows must meet the following requirement:
 - * Health Requirements: Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) will be required for every animal exhibited. **It is expected that junior exhibitors will bring only healthy animals.** The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) must be dated with 45 days of the respective show. All animals are subject to being inspected after arrival at the show facilities and any with clinical signs of contagious disease will be sent home immediately. Certificate(s) of Veterinary Inspection are to accompany the animal(s) to the respective show(s).
 - * Any sheep that are to be exhibited in any show (including Commercial Ewes and Market Lamb) will be required to have an approved Scrapie Program ear tag in their ear. This must be done in accordance with the guidelines provided by USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and the rules of the Tennessee Department of Agriculture.
- Note: Withers are no longer exempt from the Scrapie identification requirements.**
- * Exhibitors who have breeding flocks will be required to have official USDA identification in order to show or to sell ewe or ram lambs for exhibition and/or breeding. This is done by filing out the appropriate form to obtain a flock/premise identification number and ear tags. Existing flock identification numbers may be allowed if properly registered. If this has not already been done, it is recommended that it be done as soon as possible.
 - * Exhibitors who purchase the ewes they will show must be certain the ewes have been tagged by the breeder (flock of birth). Avoid purchasing ewes to exhibit if they don't have approved ear tags.
7. Warts and ringworm are considered contagious and infectious diseases and are permissible exclusions only if considered inactive by the issuing veterinarian and noted as such on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
 8. Scabies, contagious ecthyma (soremouth), footrot, cutaneous fungal and bacterial infections (ie. club lamb disease, caseous lymphadenitis) are considered contagious and infectious diseases, and are permissible exclusions only if considered inactive by the issuing veterinarian and noted as such on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
 9. **Fair officials are responsible** for ensuring that all animals entering fairs for exhibition be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and are in overall good health. Violations should be reported to the state veterinarian or his agent.

TDA - Regulatory Services - Animal Health

Summary: Livestock Health Requirements for Fairs & Exhibitions

I. GENERAL:

- a. All stalls, pens, chutes, etc. located on the grounds of fairs and exhibitions shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected with a disinfectant approved by USDA, APHIS between each scheduled fair or exhibition.

- b. All livestock (except poultry) which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification or sufficient description to identify each animal. Certificates for this purpose shall be valid for ninety (90) days from date of issue. (Tennessee livestock only—out of state certificates are valid for thirty (30) days from the date of issue.)
- c. No animal showing clinical signs of infectious or communicable disease shall be allowed to enter or remain on premises of fairs and exhibitions. It shall be the responsibility of the manager of each event to assure prompt removal of such animals.

II. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING WITHIN THE STATE OF TN

(Certificate of Veterinary Inspection Valid for a Period of Ninety (90) days)

SWINE: All swine shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification or sufficient description to identify each animal.

CATTLE: All cattle shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification or sufficient description to identify each animal.

POULTRY:

- 1. Sponsors of poultry shows or exhibitions shall notify the Tennessee Department of Agriculture at least thirty (30) days prior to show or exhibition.
- 2. All poultry assembled at shows or exhibitions shall be accompanied by evidence of a negative test for Pullorum-Typhoid within ninety (90) days or originate directly from a flock which has been certified as Pullorum-Typhoid Clean under the Tennessee Poultry Improvement Plan.
- 3. Poultry found not to be in apparent good health shall be removed immediately from any show or exhibition.

HORSES & OTHER EQUIDAE: Animals six (6) months of age and older must have a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (Swamp Fever) test within the preceding twelve (12) months.

SHEEP: All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4. All sheep that move within the state with the exception of whethers under the age of 18 months that are produced for slaughter only, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 thru 79.4.

GOATS: Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4. All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 thru 79.4.

CAMELIDAE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01.

CERVIDAE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01.

III. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING OUTSIDE THE STATE OF TN

Livestock and Poultry entering fairs and exhibitions from areas outside the State of Tennessee shall be subject to current Tennessee Import requirements. Please contact the state veterinarian's office regarding questions or recent changes to these rules. These interstate requirements are summarized as follows:

All species (except poultry) - Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection valid for thirty (30) days.

CATTLE-Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:

1) Tuberculosis: No requirements except from states having a tuberculosis culture positive in the last 12 months.

2) Brucellosis: Test eligible cattle - Intact male or female cattle eighteen (18) months or older. (Vaccinates or Non-vaccinates)

Certified Herds - No test requirements.

Class Free States - No test requirements.

Class A - Negative test within 30 days.

SWINE:

1) Breeding Swine:

A. 30 day negative test for pseudorabies, or

B. Originate from Qualified Negative Pseudorabies Herd, or

- c. Originate directly from a herd in a Stage V (Pseudorabies-Free) State,
- d. If four (4) months of age or older, negative test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days or originate directly from a Validated Brucellosis-free herd or originated directly from a Validated Brucellosis-Free State.

2) Feeding Swine:

- a. 30 day negative test for pseudorabies, or
- b. Originate from Qualified Negative Pseudorabies Herd, or
- c. Originate from Pseudorabies Monitored Herd, or
- d. Originate from a herd in Stage III, IV, or V state in the National Pseudorabies Eradication Program.

HORSES AND OTHER EQUINES: Animals six (6) months of age or older - negative equine infections anemia (Swamp Fever) test within twelve (12) months.

POULTRY: Originate directly from a Pullorum-Typhosis Clean flock, or be accompanied by evidence of negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within (90) days.

SHEEP: All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4. All sheep that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

GOATS: Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 thru 79.4. All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 thru 79.4.

CAMELIDAE: Same requirements as for cattle.

CERVIDAE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:

- 1) Brucellosis: Same requirements as for cattle..
- 2) Tuberculosis:

(a) All cervidae shall originate in herds which have had a negative herd test for tuberculosis within twelve (12) months with a USDA approved single cervical test and individual imported animals shall be negative to the single cervical test within thirty (30) days of entry; or

(b) Animals not originating in tested herds as described above must test negative to two (2) single cervical tests at least ninety (90) days apart, the second test conducted not more than thirty (30) days prior to entry. IV. Fair association or exhibition management shall inform exhibitors of the rules of this chapter, and shall notify the State Veterinarian or his agent of any violations. Exhibitors shall present evidence of compliance with this chapter to the State Veterinarian or his agent upon request. These rules constitute a minimum legal standard and in no way restrict the right of fair and exhibition managers to establish additional or more stringent requirements.

Attention: It is important for anyone showing sheep or goats in the Tennessee State Fair to understand and comply with the USDA/APHIS Scrapie Program requirements.

All intact males (bucks, rams) and females (ewes, does) that show must have approved ear tags (or acceptable alternative). This must be done in accordance with the guidelines provided by USDA Animal Health and Plant Inspection Service (APHIS).

**NOTE: Wethers are no longer exempt from the
Scrapie Identification requirements.**

TN Department of Agriculture - Imported Fire Ants Movement Permit

Tennessee State Fair exhibitors from the state of Tennessee will be required to get a Movement Permit (to prevent the movement of Imported Fire Ants) from their local county extension office or the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, Plant Certification Office @ 615-837-5130 if they are located in a fire ant regulated area and are shipping hay or straw to non-regulated areas. The enclosed web site gives a verbal description of the boundaries of the Imported Fire Ant Quarantine in Tennessee. A map of the Imported Fire Ant Quarantined area for the US is available at <http://www.aphis.usda.gov/ppq/maps/fireant.pdf>

If the exhibitor is from outside Tennessee, but in the regulated area, it is preferred that they provide a permit from their state of origin. The permit serves as verification that the hay or straw meets compliance from being in contact with the ground and is found to be apparently free of fire ants. Baled hay or straw that has been stored in direct contact with the ground for more than 7 days can not be moved from anywhere in the federal imported fire ant regulated area to non-regulated areas. In Tennessee, regulated areas include all or portions of the following counties: Bedford, Bledsoe, Blount, Bradley, Carroll, Chester, Coffee, Decatur, Fayette, Franklin, Giles, Grundy, Hamilton, Hardeman, Hardin, Haywood, Henderson, Hickman, Lawrence, Lewis, Lincoln, Loudon, Madison, Marion, Marshall, Maury, McMinn, McNairy, Meigs, Monroe, Moore, Perry, Polk, Rhea, Roane, Sequatchie, Shelby, and Wayne.

General Information

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

We want to welcome all livestock exhibitors and hope you will plan on showing your cattle, swine, sheep, or perhaps take part in the mule pulling contest this year. This year, the Tennessee State Fair Association is offering over \$90,000.00 in total premiums with \$53,000 designated for livestock .

Premium Checks

Premium checks will be mailed three weeks after the conclusion of the Fair.

You must provide your complete address and social security number on entry forms so that mail will reach you without delay. Checks will be made out to the individual making entries and mailed to their home address. Premium checks will not be mailed out until the exhibitor's Social Security number has been provided for IRS purposes. When making entries, give name and proper mailing address. If in a city, give street and number with zip code. If in a rural community, give RFD number and post office and zip code. If entry is being made by a minor, give name and address of parents together with RFD number and post office. This is absolutely necessary so that premium checks may be properly addressed, as all such checks will be mailed directly to the exhibitor.

Replacement checks for lost or misplaced checks will not be issued until forty-five (45) days after reporting to the Livestock Superintendent of the lost or misplaced check.

CASH CHECKS PROMPTLY !! PREMIUM CHECKS BECOME NULL AND VOID AFTER 60 DAYS.

CHECKS NOT CASHED WITHIN 60 DAYS WILL NOT BE REISSUED.

No deviation will be made from this premium list. No official, superintendent or employee has authority to add or take from any premium money in any class and if money is not earned in its respective class it cannot be shifted to another .

PROTESTS:

All protests will be determined by the Livestock Executive Committee, and must be made in writing, signed and filed with the Livestock Superintendent, within 24 hours after the show. 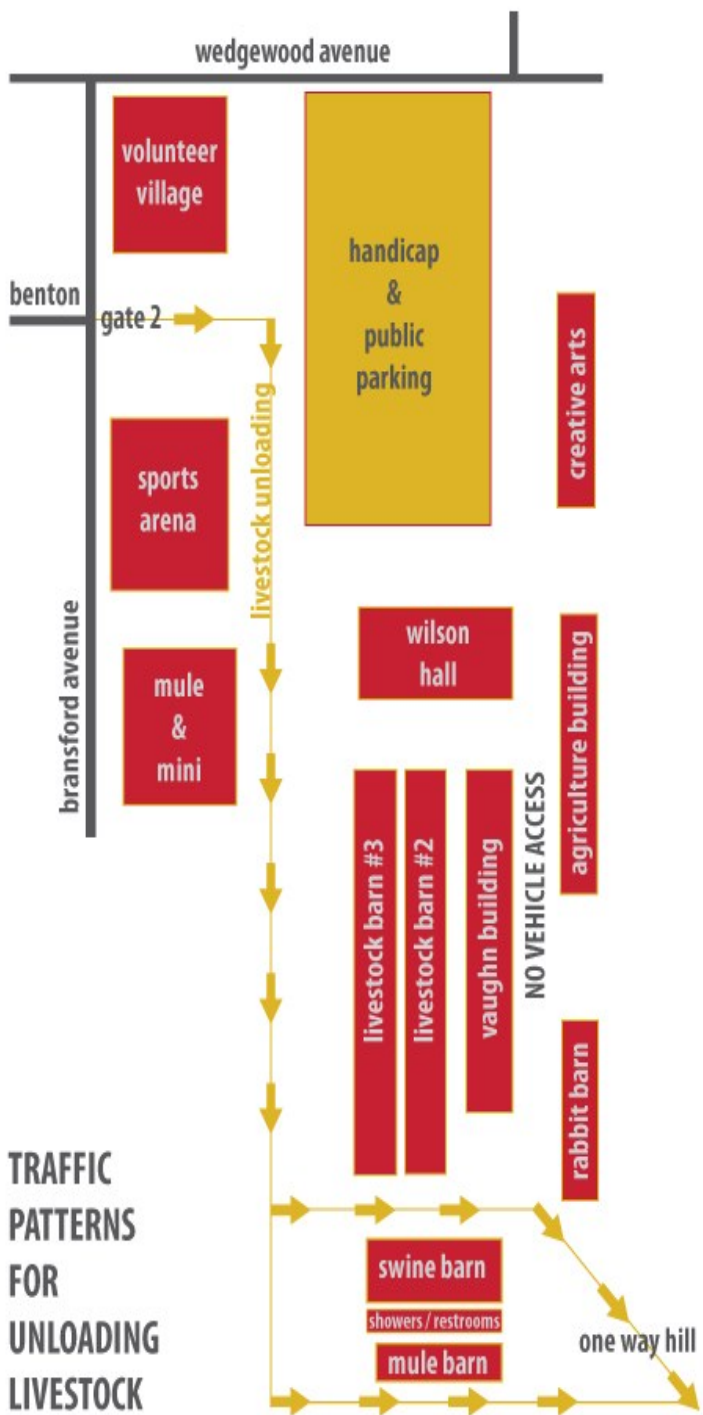

Official Veterinarian: The Tennessee State Fair will appoint an official veterinarian. The veterinarian in charge will be available for services and emergencies at a charge to the owner for services rendered. Contact Livestock Office

RULES

1. Entries are open to the world with the exception of restrictions imposed by the rules for each type of livestock.
2. **ENTRY FEES and ENTRY DEADLINES ARE LOCATED ON PAGE 12. This will be strictly enforced. Absolutely no FAX ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**
3. **Livestock passes must be purchased when sending in entry fees. Additional livestock passes and one day passes may be purchased at Benton Avenue gate. You will pick your livestock pass up at the Benton Avenue gate upon arrival to the fairgrounds. The livestock trailer pass is good only for one truck/ trailer. Any admission to the Fair requires either a Livestock pass or a general admission ticket. See page 2 for admission fees. You must use the Benton Avenue gate when bringing livestock onto the fairgrounds. NO EXCEPTIONS.**
4. When entries exceed stall or pen facilities, animals will be accepted according to the date the entries are accepted on line or postmarked. Submit your entries early.
5. **All entries for livestock must be legible and submitted on fair entry forms. Entries must be made in the name shown on the registration papers.**
6. **An exhibitor is the owner as shown on the registration certificate.**
7. **The name and registration/tag number of each animal must be shown on the entry forms at the time of entry. No premium will be paid to any exhibitor who fails to observe this rule.**
8. Stalls and pens are furnished for show stock only.
9. **NO BEDDING WILL BE FURNISHED BY THE FAIR. Exhibitors can bring their own bedding or bedding can be purchased from the Livestock Office. During the fair, other merchants will not be allowed to deliver feed/ bedding to the fairgrounds.**
10. All exhibits must have an attendant with the animals until the entry books are completed. The attendant must have in his/her possession all necessary health certificates and the proper breed association registration papers.
11. An animal may be shown in only one breed show.
12. An employee of the National Breed Association will assume full responsibility for establishing the lot for each animal in the breeds that are broken down into lot numbers after arriving at the fair.
13. See the Arrival/Release Schedule or the individual departments for the check-in and release times. **Tardiness beyond the official breed arrival time will not be tolerated.** Failure to heed this rule will result in forfeiture of premiums. **A RELEASE FORM IS REQUIRED FOR ALL LIVESTOCK.**
14. Every animal and article upon exhibition shall be under the control of fair management, and while every reasonable precaution will be taken for the safeguarding of same, neither the management, its officers, employees

- or agents will be responsible for any loss or damage by fire, accidents, vandalism, or theft, whatever may be the cause of amount or damage, nor will the fair be liable as warehouseman for property of the exhibitor.
15. Right is reserved to carry over the programs from day to day, or cancel any classes on account of tornado, hurricane, excessive rain, fire, or any other calamity over which the fair has no control.
 16. Superintendent of Livestock will be in charge of the order of judging and the supervision of the ring. The Livestock Superintendent reserves the right to substitute another qualified Judge to a show if necessary.
 17. **No refunds will be given on entry fees.**
 18. Any exhibitor who does not abide by Fair Regulations including washing animals in undesignated areas, dumping milk in undesignated areas, blocking passageway gates in the barns or removing animals from the fairgrounds without a release will forfeit all premiums. Removing animals from the fairgrounds early and without a release will FORFEIT ALL PREMIUMS. The only legitimate excuse for early release is sickness or death and must have the department's Superintendent approval.
 19. Regardless of the number of head of stock an exhibitor has entered in an individual lot, only two monies will be paid to the exhibitor in that particular lot. If more than one grouping of stock is entered into a group lot, only one money will be paid to that exhibitor in that particular group lot.
 20. Premiums will be paid according to the official awards entered in the judge's book. The judge's records shall be final.
 21. No deviation will be made from this premium list. No official, superintendent or employee has authority to add to or take from any premium money in any class. Money not earned in its respective class cannot be shifted to another class.
 22. To continue breed shows, the following qualifications must be met each year: Beef and Dairy breeds must have a minimum of five exhibitors and 30 animals for two consecutive years; Sheep, Swine, and Dairy Goat breeds must have a minimum of three exhibitors and 25 animals. If the quality of exhibits falls below the standard of creditable exhibitors, that show will be eliminated the following year, at the discretion of the Director of the Fair.
 23. All trailers and trucks will be parked in the designated parking area.
**** A LOCK IS RECOMMENDED FOR ALL TRAILERS****
 24. ***NEW*** Trailers and trucks hauling pulling-mules can park near the pulling shed from weigh-in (2:00 pm) until one (1) hour after completion of the contest, on the days of the mule pulling contest **only**.
 25. All dogs MUST be on a leash.
 26. No smoking in any barn or in any building on the fairgrounds.
 27. Alcohol is not permitted in livestock areas.

2. **ENTRY FEES AND DEADLINES LOCATED ON PAGE 12.**
3. Mules may be brought in and taken back day of contests.
4. **Wild and unmanageable mules will not be eligible to pull.**
5. Owner must furnish own harness and doubletree. Fair will provide pulling sled.
6. Mules will be officially weighed by a representative designated by the Superintendent of livestock. Mules will be weighed with halters only. No reweighing will be permitted. No weighing will be permitted after the pulling contest begins. Mules will be marked for identification at the time of weighing.
7. A heavyweight entry whose weight falls under 2,005 lbs. may be allowed to pull at the 2,005 lb. weight. This is at the discretion of the mule pulling department head.
8. Official scales test weights will be used as load weight.
9. Each competing team will have three tries to move the load a total of ten feet. On a harness break, the driver will be given the option of accepting that pull or trying that pull again.
10. Only one driver will be permitted during pulling. An exception may be allowed for driver injury. One helper may be used in hitching up. Only the driver and his helper will be permitted in the arena.
11. A team must complete the ten foot pull within a three minute time limit that will begin when a team is hitched to the pulling sled.
12. The next competing team must enter the arena within a three minute time limit that will begin when the preceding team is unhitched from the pulling sled.
13. A load must be pulled forward between the boundaries of the pulling alley. Seesawing will not be permitted. A mule stepping on or over the boundaries of the pulling alley will result in the loss of that pull
14. A driver will not be permitted to put his hands on his team while pulling. Failure to observe this rule will result in the loss of that pull.

15. Any unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of any exhibitor or his helpers will result in the forfeiture of any premium won by that exhibitor. Both he and his mules will be barred from further pulling competition.
16. No beating, striking, punching, slapping with end of line, electric shock or any other stimulant including scheduled drugs of any kind will be permitted. The Tennessee State Veterinarian or a State Certified Veterinarian will make inspections and their decision will be final.
17. Weight of sled will be used in total weight pulled. Winners and champions will be determined by the greatest ratio of pulled weight over team weight.
18. The minimum add-on weight for teams in the lightweight contest is 200 lbs. and 300 lbs. for the heavy weight contest. The department head may add additional weight at his discretion.
19. Exhibitors must comply with all applicable General Livestock Rules and Livestock Health Requirements set forth in this catalog.

The American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Boulevard, St. Joseph, Missouri, will participate in premiums offered for open class Angus breeding cattle classes according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The premium assistance should not be used to offset show expense and shall be included in the premium payments distributed by the show to the exhibitors. A minimum of 50 head must be shown in the open class division to receive American Angus Association premium participation for the following year. Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay on championship, get-of-sire, junior get-of-sire or breeder six-head classes.

***NEW*: An Open Junior Heifer Show will run simultaneously with the open show, premiums will be awarded.**

1. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show. Electronically stored registration certificates are NOT accepted - only original certificates issued by the American Angus Association. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-tattooed and re-checked at the show.
2. Any female shown with calf at side, the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf and the calf must be registered by show date and have the original registration certificate at check in.
3. Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.
4. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules; Rule 800 series; including Rule 800-810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.

5. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.
6. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a “white towel” or “white glove” test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.
7. All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
8. Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animals from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

RULES

1. Heifers 24 months of age or older to be eligible must have produced a calf or be safe in calf as verified by a graduate veterinarian. If animal is open due to being in an embryo transfer program, this fact must be verified by a written statement signed by a licensed embryo technician.
2. A cow shown with calf at side: Calf must be her natural calf meeting the standard of excellence.
3. All senior bull classes (late jr. yearling bull and over) must have either a nose ring or a nose clip for show purposes.
4. All animals must be individually identified by tattoo numerical firebrand, or freeze brand.
5. To be eligible to compete in SGBI approved junior shows, animal(s) must be recorded in the name of the junior member. This recorded junior must feed, fit, care for, and show the animal entered.
6. All animals must be exhibited with the hair brushed down on the entire body, legs, and tail with no foreign objects attached to the animal in a manner as to alter the animal's conformation or change its appearance. * Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points by the same exhibitors.
7. Each animal exhibited must be exhibited with the correct age and shown in the class corresponding with their correct age.
8. Entries in each class will be placed 1, 2, 3, etc. Animals are to be presented in descending order according to age.
9. Polled classes will be entered at the same time as class entries are required by each show. Animals will be lined up according to age for the judge.
10. To be eligible to show in Best of Polled, animals to be slick polled with no scurs, no scars, no dehorning and with no evidence of horny tissue. Animals will be inspected by Field Service Representative (if present) assisted by one member of Shows and Exhibits Committee or Breed Standards Committee if needed to settle disputes. If no Field Service Representative is present, it will be done by committee members not involved in that lot.
11. SGBI reserves the right to tooth animals without prior notice to the breeders in order to verify age of cattle.

13. In all shows in which fifty (50) head or less entered, all early and late classes may be combined at the discretion of the show officials.
14. Classes with over thirty (30) entries should be divided into sections and section winners return for final placing.
15. The Judge must be an SGBI approved judge. This is a Santa Gertrudis Point Show.
16. Each exhibitor must be a member in good standings with SGBI.
17. Dress for showing in an approved SGBI show shall be of clean and neat clothing. Hats or bareheaded with no caps. This is for both Open and Junior shows. No tennis shoes.

18. Juniors showing in open shows is allowed and encouraged. Entry must be shown by the owner or immediate family member (sister, brother, mother, father, grandparents). No animal may be fitted or shown by any open exhibitor at any time during the junior's ownership period. An exception is transportation, feed and care, to a show may be allowed. Refer to junior ownership rules.
19. Each animal shall be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, or other appearance change for cosmetic purposes, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Silicon injection or other injections for cosmetic purpose shall be prohibited.
20. If entries are not properly fitted and good herdsmanship followed the owner may be asked to not display their cattle until adhering to the proper procedures as outlined in our herdsmanship paper.
21. ETHICS: The showing of unethically fitted livestock or livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body. Animals showing signs of having been operated upon or tampered with for the purpose of concealing faults in conformation or with intent to deceive relative to the animal's soundness, will be disqualified. Every exhibitor, in consideration of his entry being accepted, agrees to submit any animal so entered by him to inspection and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the Shows and Exhibits Committee and agrees that the conclusions reached by the committee as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or overage, shall be final, without recourse against SGBI and designated personnel. Any false representation, interference or unprofessional conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with by the Shows and Exhibits Committee according to the equities of the case.
22. Any exhibitor whether it be the owner or custom fitter or anyone else who has the custody of the animal being shown in any SGBI approved show, who shows an animal which has had an anabolic steroid administration to it either by injection or diuretic or any other administration, shall be barred from showing in an SGBI approved show for a period of six (6) months for the first offense, one year for the second offense and for life for the third offense. The animal shall be barred from ever showing in a SGBI approved show again.
23. No pumping or filling of an animal with liquid, air or any other substance is allowed. Violations will result in disqualification and banning from all shows of that exhibitor and/or owner.
24. Any exhibitor who knowingly shows an animal in a SGBI approved show who is in violation of the rule herein above set forth relating to showing an animal in its natural conformation and structure as defined herein above may be suspended by the Board of Directors for six (6) months for the first offense, one year for the second offense and for life for the third offense.
25. Any person who furnished the birthday of the animal to SGBI either on the IPRA of some other document (whereby that birthday information is transferred to the Registration certificate) and that animal is exhibited in a SGBI approved show with an incorrect age and the age determined by the SGBI designated veterinarian exceeds the age listed on the registration certificate by more than 30 days, the person furnishing the birthday above and such person furnishing said information to SGBI for inclusion on the registration certificate shall be barred from showing in a SGBI approved show for a period of six (6) months for the first offense, one year for the second offense and for life for the third offense. However, the animal, if transferred to another owner, may be placed in the correct class and be shown again.

26. Each exhibitor shall submit his registered Santa Gertrudis cattle to such tests and examinations as may be requested and/or required by the SGBI, its authorized representatives, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show or fair.
27. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any SGBI approved show each exhibitor hereby releases SGBI, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgement past, present or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision there from.
28. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any test, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his animals, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the association.
29. Appeals: An appeal from the decision of the veterinarian or designated association representation designated by the SGBI under sections 1 and 4 of the Inspection of Exhibits may be made to the Executive Committee of SGBI if the following requirements are satisfied:
 - (1) The appeal is in writing and is signed by the appealing party; and
 - (2) The appealing party files the written appeal with SGBI Board of Directors or SGBI Representative or fair officials as soon as possible after the veterinarian's or designated association representatives' decision is rendered and in any event within six (6) hours of the time of the veterinarian's or designated association representatives' decision was made. If an appeal satisfying the foregoing requirements is filed with the SGBI Board of Directors, the Board of Directors shall hold a hearing at which the appealing party and the Veterinarian or designated association representatives whose decision is being appealed shall present statements and other evidence that is relevant to the matter, following which the Board of Directors shall render a decision which shall be final and conclusive.
30. Failure to adhere to each shows specific rules shall also be subject to these penalties. Proper protest procedures must be adhered to according to that particular show's rules. SGBI will follow each show's rules and any action taken by a show will be upheld by SGBI in relation to its bearing on our pointshow system.
31. Disqualifications: An exhibitor who has been disqualified from competition in any livestock show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of rule violation(s) will not be allowed to compete in other shows. This shall include, but is not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting or deception. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal that a judge over-looked an animal will be considered. If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative, interferes with the judge(s), or shows any disrespect to them or to show officials, the existing show may excuse him/her from the ring and exclude them from further competition; exhibitor premiums that may have been awarded may also be withheld. If an animal is disqualified after having won awards or premiums, the animals placing below him may be moved up (at the option of the Shows and Exhibits Committee) to fill the vacated position.

6. Each exhibitor and/or owner of Red Angus cattle entered in any Red Angus show or exhibition is required to ensure that each animal will be exhibited in its natural conformation and structure and without any alterations or modifications, with the exception of acceptable fitting, grooming and treatment of hooves.
7. The addition of any hair or hair-like substances shall be considered an unethical practice and will not be allowed in Red Angus competition.
8. All females 20 months of age or older (on announced date of show) exhibited at a show sponsored by the RAAA must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy from a licensed veterinarian or have produced fertile eggs as certified in a written statement by a licensed veterinarian or embryologist or have a calf at side. Failure to show documentation will result in the animal being ineligible to show.
9. All bulls 9 months of age or older (on announced date of show) exhibited at a show sponsored by the RAAA must be shown with a nose lead.
10. All classes with 10 head or more entered and accepted after processing verifies that all other requirements have been fulfilled, must be split according to age. The numbers after the split should be as even as possible in each sub-class to encourage fair competition. (Add 6-08).
11. Any calf born from a dam entered in the National Red Angus Show after the entry deadline of the show has passed, and that said calf is not showing in an individual class, does not need to be registered to be shown along side its dam as her proof of pregnancy requirement. However, the calf must meet the requirements to be registered outlined in Section C of the Red Angus Breeder's Guide and qualify for Category 1A or 1B status as required by Section J, RR37, General Regulations-a) of the Red Angus Breeder's Guide. (Add 6-08).
12. Each entry in a Red Angus show must be made in the name of the owner of record, or a member of the immediate family of the owner of record, appearing on the Registration Certificate.
13. Partnership animals must be so registered and entered under the partnership designation.
14. Exhibitors must have official Registration or Incomplete Registration Certificates on all entries available for inspection by show and/or Association officials. This may include officially produced copies of original Registration Certificates obtainable from the Red Angus Association National Office..
15. Animals entered in any Red Angus show must have been registered in the name of the person entering said animal(s) not less than 30 days prior to the date of judging.

American Brahman Breeders Association Special Rules:

1. Animals must be registered in the American Brahman Breeders Association to be eligible to compete in association sponsored shows. The registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the superintendent or manager of the show at the time entries are verified prior to judging.
2. The registration number and animal identification number (number branded on an animal) of (1) each animal must be entered in an individual class, (2) the sire of each get-of-sire entry and (3) the dam of each produce-of-dam entry must be listed on the entry card of each animal entered.
3. Entries that have not complied with rules one (1) and two (2) will not be eligible to show, receive premium monies or earn points in the association's Register of Renown.
4. Animals to be eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in individual classes.
5. Entries will be listed numerically according to age (oldest first) in catalogs and judging schedules. Include animal identification number (number brand) as a part of identification. When entering the arena for judging, the handlers will line cattle up numerically in the same order.
6. Judges will be allowed to comment on placings in selected classes when conditions permit.
7. Each animal will be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical or circulatory constriction including branding or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Injections of foreign substances internally for cosmetic purposes, steroids, growth hormones or stimulants shall be prohibited. If to the satisfaction of the ABBA's staff, officers, executive committee or board of directors any animal that has had its natural conformation or structure altered or been administered steroids, growth hormones or stimulants, then the said animal shall be ruled ineligible to compete until such time the Show Committee and owner/owners have reviewed the case. Any violators both owner & fitter will be in-eligible to exhibit cattle at ABBA Approved Shows for 5 years.
8. In cases where families, companies, corporations, etc., are operated as a unit under the same management but have cattle also registered in the name of the individual partners, said cattle, even though bearing a different ownership brand, are eligible to be shown in competition under the firm name provided they have not been and will not be shown in the name of the individuals.
9. For females being shown in the three oldest classes (Current year less 3 years) exhibitor must have a certificate of pregnancy issued by a licensed veterinarian will be presented to show officials at time of check-in or registration paper check. The show reserves the right to perform pregnancy determination by palpation for the females in the above classes at any given ABBA approved show if an official protest has been filed. Females exhibited in the last class at the Spring Shows **MUST** have a calf at side. For Fall Shows only the last class of females is required to have a calf at side also. The only exemption from this rule will be cows that have already weaned a calf and a registration certificate of the calf **MUST** be presented to the judge.

10. **All bulls will be shown with a nose ring or nose restraint with lead attached.** For bulls being shown in the oldest class, the exhibitor must have a certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating the bull has produced viable semen. The certificate must be available for inspection by the judge on request.
11. This deals with the Produce-of-Dam classes and the Get-of-Sire class. Embryo Produce of Dam - Two animals from the above classes produced by one dam by embryo transfer either or both sexes may be represented. No ownership requirement. Natural Produce-of-Dam - Two natural born animals produced by one dam from the above classes, either or both sexes may be represented. No ownership requirement. Get-of-Sire - Four animals from at least two dams by one sire from the above individual classes, both sexes represented. No ownership requirement.
12. No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one produce or embryo-produce of dam per dam.
13. Cows that are exhibited with calves at side must be in lactating stage. Calves must be shown and exhibited with their dams and said calves must not exceed 240 days of age on day of judging. The judge will be made aware by the ring steward for those cows whose calves are ineligible to show by this rule.
14. Cattle will not be allowed to show if their switches have been balled or glitter applied to their skin.
15. The intent of the ABBA in shows that exhibit a large number of cattle is to divide the cattle into separate red and grey divisions (Rev. 10/13/05). If so, the following procedure will apply. All grey cattle and solid black cattle will show grey. Red, black & white speckled or red & white speckled cattle will show red. Cattle with questionable colored pigmentation may be entered in the color division the breeder selects, however, said cattle are subject to inspection by a three (3) member ABBA committee. If the Color Committee disagrees with the breeder, the pedigree of said animal will then be used to aid in the final determination. In those cases where questionable colored cattle possess both red and grey breeding, then the committee will make the final determination. The decision of the committee is final. Once animals have been classified they will remain in that classification unless they were young at the time of classification and it is apparent that they have changed their color. In the Get-of-Sire and Produce-of-Dam classes, breeders will be allowed to show cattle of mixed color. They will be entered as to the color division they are assigned by the color committee for the show. At split shows where the Color Committee is not present, a staff member with two (2) ABBA Directors will clarify questionable colored cattle for that particular show. The final classification will be done by the Color Committee(Rev. 08/99).
16. The owner of record of any registered animal entered in an ABBA approved show and/or his/her agent, exhibitor, fitter, handler and/or representative releases ABBA and its representatives from any and all liability that seller/owner might claim as a result of injury of any kind sustained before, during, or after handling cattle for any ABBA board approved activity.
17. This show is an ABBA Point Show. For shows to remain ABBA approved, point shows must maintain a twenty (20) head average for the previous two (2) years.
18. The official ABBA rules & procedures governing showing & exhibiting of registered Brahman cattle supersede any rules printed in any show catalog.
19. In an attempt to insure that all animals receive an equal evaluation at the National and International Shows, classes with more than 30 entries may at the discretion of the Show Management and / or ABBA Officials be split by age as evenly as possible.

The National Director for the North American Limousin Foundation recognizes the show ring as a means of displaying Limousin cattle, and as a method for breeders to promote their program. The NALF supports the showing of Limousin breeding cattle, but does not provide premium money for shows. Premium money must be raised by the state organization sponsoring the shows or entry fees from exhibitors. In order to encourage the proper use of the show ring, the NALF Board list the following guidelines:

1. All animals must be registered with the North America Limousin Foundation. Embryo Transfer calves with pending registration must have parentage verification paperwork in the NALF system

2. **Animals must be either 75 percent Limousin (NALF percentage, not actual) or greater as indicated on orange NALF registration certificates or purple-papered Lim-Flex cattle as indicated by NALF registration certificates. Percentage , fullblood, pure-breed and Lim-Flex cattle shall compete in the same classes and championship. If a show does not abide by the NALF MOE show rules exhibitors will not be awarded points for this show.**
3. Animals must be properly tattooed and will be inspected at the show. Tattoos must be legible and match the registration certificates. If an animal's tattoo is not legible or cannot be read upon initial check-in , it will be ineligible to show and not be allowed to return with a new or corrected tattoo.
4. To maintain a high degree of confidence in Limousin shows, NALF reserves the right to disqualify any animal that has been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting shall include the following:
 - a. Any use of paints, hair coloring conditioners, colored show foam, graphite, colored powders or any other substances. A animal maybe subject to a white towel test;
 - b. The addition of any hair or hair like substances, including false tail heads and false polls (False tail switches are allowed);
 - c. The cutting, tearing or gluing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal or the injection of any gas, solid or liquid under the hide to alter the normal conformation;
 - d. Any products, solutions or liquids administered internally or externally to alter the conformation of the animal is prohibited. That includes the use of steroids, growth stimulants, and the act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other method.
 - e. Exception: In the case of severely sick or dehydrated animals, the exhibitor may have fluids or electrolytes administered by the licensed official show veterinarian with the approval of the show superintendent or a NALF representative. That exception is not applicable on show day or weigh-in/check-in day.
5. Bulls older than one (1) year must show with a nose lead The Limousin show superintendent and the show management reserves the right to disqualify animals deemed unmanageable.
6. All protests against exhibitors or individual animals or fitting violations must be submitted in writing and signed by five (5) active members of the NALF and presented to the show superintendent within 12 hours of the show's completion.
7. NALF reserves the right to mouth animals for dental development.
8. NALF reserves the right to collect hair samples from any animal.
9. Classes and championship breaks will be determined after all cattle have been checked in. No class shall contain more than 20 head or have an age spread of more than 60 days unless the animals are older than 2 years.
10. Calves exhibited alongside dams in the cow/calf division are not eligible to show as individuals.
11. Animals shown must be solid red or black above the flanks, excluding birth marks.

Other Requirements:

The following performance-data-submission requirements must be met by Dec. 1 to receive Medal of Excellence points.

- a. Birth weight (bulls and heifers)
- b. Weaning weight (bulls and heifers)
- c. Yearling weight (bulls and heifers)
- d. Yearling scrotal circumference
- e. Pregnancy test (females older than 600 days at season's end)
- f. Breeding Soundness Exam and semen test (bulls older than 400 days)

NOTE:

- Failure to have performance data on file at NALF by **that date** will result in disqualification from the MOE program, and no points will be awarded. It is the responsibility of the breeder/owner/exhibitor to submit that information **without** special requests from NALF.

1. Only active members and active junior members of the American Chianina Assn. (ACA) are eligible to show and/or receive premium monies provided by the ACA. Membership may be obtained by writing to the American Chianina Assn., P.O. Box 890, Platte City, MO 64079 or by phoning (816) 431-2808.
2. All cattle entered **MUST BE REGISTERED IN THE AMERICAN CHIANINA HERD BOOK**. Cattle may **NOT** be shown with an application for registration.
3. Original registration certificates **MUST BE PRESENTED TO THE SUPERINTENDENT AT THE SHOW!** All tattoos will be read and must agree with the registration certificate. Any animal not having a legible tattoo, or a tattoo not corresponding with its registration certificate will be ineligible to compete and will be barred from showing.
4. The surgical or non-surgical alteration of conformation of an animal is prohibited. This includes altering the conformation by typing up the dewlap, brisket, sheath or navel. Cattle are to be shown in their natural conformation. ***NO ALTERING** of the heads or removal of scurs from Chiangus cattle is permitted. **IF A CHIANGUS HEAD HAS BEEN ALTERED IN ANY WAY, THAT ANIMAL IS NOT ELIGIBLE TO SHOW AS A CHIANGUS.**
 - *All horned Chianina must be dehorned prior to being shown.
 - *The use of false tail heads is prohibited. *The addition of hair, or any similar substance, to any part of an animal's body is prohibited. *Dyeing or artificially changing the color of an animal is prohibited. Coloring agents, except powders, may be used on the legs and tail switches. No coloring agent may be used above the animal's flank. **NO POWDER** of any kind or color may be used on **ANY** part of an animal.
5. All Chianina bulls one year of age or older must have a permanent nose ring with a lead attached to the ring.
6. All cattle will be made available for a veterinary examination to determine the presence of altering and/or determination of horns or scurs. All cattle will be made available for a veterinary examination to be mouthed. Exhibitor agrees to abide by the determinations of the examining veterinarian(s).
7. BY entering cattle in any show, the exhibitor agrees to abide by all show rules. The final interpretation of all show rules will be made by the officials of the American Chianina Association and their decision will be final.

3. All fleeces entered in purebred lots must have been shorn from purebred sheep recorded in their respective breed registries.
4. All fleeces must be rolled flesh side out. They may be displayed in clear plastic bags or tied with paper twine. The management reserves the right to reject any fleeces containing any excessive amount of foreign material, such as tags, burrs, straw, etc.
5. All fleeces must have been grown on sheep owned by the exhibitor.
6. Each exhibitor is limited to two fleeces per ram or ewe lot. An exhibitor may enter as many different lots as desired.
7. The management will receive fleeces brought in by the exhibitor or sent prepaid by mail or express, marked attention "Tennessee State Fair Fleece Show" 625 Smith Ave suite 200, Nashville, TN 37203, and see that such fleeces are properly displayed. **DO NOT send entry forms in boxes with fleeces. Entries should be mailed in separately by the deadline. The Tennessee State Fair will take all reasonable care with your fleeces, but it is NOT responsible for any damage or loss.** Each fleece must be properly tagged, stating name, breed, sex, and lot entered. Please note also if the fleece is for sale and its minimum price. At the conclusion of the Fair, any remaining fleeces will become the property of the Fair. Exhibitor is entitled to reclaim any or all of his fleeces by the scheduled release time, but the management will not be responsible for returning or forwarding fleeces by mail or express. Any other arrangement for the disposing of the fleeces, other than those outlined, will be the direct responsibility of the exhibitor
8. The judge has power to classify fleeces before making awards.
9. Judging of Fleeces: Quality or fineness must be typical of the registered breed represented. Factors to be considered when judging: evenness and quality of fineness among the various part of the fleece, length and strength of staple, estimate clean weight, condition, and character, including crimp and color.
10. NEW BREEDS: **Breeds not listed below will be given their own ram and ewe lots if they show at least five fleeces from a minimum of three breeders. Such fleeces should be entered in the "All Other Breeds" lots, but indicate their breed on the entry form and fleece label.**
11. BREED SHOW CONTINUATION: **Any breed not showing at least five fleeces from a minimum of three breeders will not be listed in the premium book the following year.**
12. **Alpaca and Llama fleece lots have been added this year.** The general rules of this fleece show apply, however these fleeces will not compete with sheep wool fleeces for any champion awards.

Teams are encouraged to bring signs, handouts, or other educational materials. The fair will provide one table and four chairs. There will be an electrical outlet available.
7. Shawls - Each team will have five hours in which to spin weft and weave a shawl. The warp must measure at least 20 inches in the reed, and the shawl must measure at least 72 inches long, excluding fringe, when taken from the loom. Each team will provide a short, printed description of the materials and techniques used in the making of their shawl. Finished shawls will be displayed in the Creative Arts Building until the last day of the fair. Shawls may be picked up on Sunday, Sept. 19th between 5:00-8:00pm or Monday Sept 20, 1:00 – 4:00 pm.

All Swine must have a certificate of veterinary inspection. Each animal will be identified by ear notch or ear tag number.**
4. **Each exhibitor is allowed to show a maximum of two animals in each lot. One animal must be shown by owner and each animal must be accompanied by a junior exhibitor while in the ring. Only two monies will be paid any exhibitor in any lot.**
5. **Entry - All entries shall be verified by the Department Head of the show prior to day of show.**

4. No entry fee or pen rental will be charged. Ribbons will be provided to the first five places in each class or lot. Rosettes will awarded to Champions and Reserve Champions.

RULES

1. General rules of the Junior Sheep Show apply.
2. All animals entered must be registered in the name of the exhibitor or transferred to the exhibitor and in possession of the exhibitor by **Sept. 1**. The registration certificate of each animal shall be submitted to the chairman of the show when the sheep arrive at the show.
3. **All breeding sheep must be in place no later than 8:30 am. Sat. Sept. 17.** The breeding show will start at 10:00 am. All breeding sheep are released following the selection of the Supreme Champion ram and ewe.
4. Each exhibitor is allowed to show a maximum of two animals in each lot.
5. All premium money for this show will be used, but will not exceed **\$6,500**.

2. An exhibitor may show no more than four (4) lambs in the market lamb show and no more than (2) commercial ewes per class. The ear tag numbers of market lambs and commercial ewes must be listed on the entry form which is due **September 3. In order to be eligible to show, the ear tag number on the entry form must be the same as the ear tag when weighed at check-in. LAMBS MUST BE IN POSSESSION AND UNDER THE CARE OF THE EXHIBITOR BY THE ENTRY DEADLINE. HEALTH PAPERS WILL BE CHECKED.**

SHEEP SHOWING SIGNS OF LAMB FUNGUS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.

3. The commercial ewe show is open to non-registered yearling ewes and ewe lambs of any breed or combination of breeds. Commercial ewes are to be selected based on their expected future value within a pasture based Tennessee farm flock which is selling slaughter lambs to market and some replacement ewes to other producers. The emphasis of the commercial ewe project is on the ability to efficiently produce lambs with high carcass quality while maximizing the pasture resources.
4. Commercial ewe lambs and market lambs must have all milk teeth. Market lambs must be wether or ewe lambs. Ewe lambs shown as market lambs cannot be shown in the Junior Breeding Show nor the Commercial Ewe Show.
5. Yearling ewes may have no more than four permanent teeth.
6. Commercial ewes and market lambs will be weighed and assigned to classes according to age and weight with approximately 15 animals in each class. Market lambs must weigh a minimum of 75 pounds.
7. There will not be a sale in connection with this show.
8. The Market Lamb judge will be instructed to place some emphasis on breed type.
9. There will be a Champion and Reserve Champion for each breed and a Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion selected. The Supreme and Reserve Supreme champion Market Lamb and the Supreme Champion Commercial Ewe will receive a banner. The Reserve Supreme Champions will receive rosettes.
10. There will be a Champion and Reserve Champion for each breed (class) of market lambs and a Champion and Reserve Champion White Faced and Black Faced Commercial Ewe. There will be a Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion Market Lamb and Commercial Ewe selected. The Supreme Champions will receive banners and the Reserve Supreme Champions will receive rosettes.
11. **Commercial Ewes and Market Lambs must be in place by 9:00 am on Saturday, Sept 17. Commercial Ewes will be weighed starting at 9:00 am and Market Lambs at 10:00 am.** The Commercial Ewe show will follow the Breeding Ewe show and the Market Lamb show will follow the Commercial Ewe show.
